The difficult task of respecting **all** volunteer hours while balancing **all** members' skill sets, coupled with accomplishing **all** chores to be done - requires a special person.....**YOU!** Be **BOLD** - step up - approached in a positive and supportive manner, you might find that your Friends' group leader(s) whole-heartedly welcome your input, and, your energy!

NOTE TO SELF: There is **always something** to be learned by spending a day sharing with Friends! If you imagine that there isn't anything left to learn about supporting your library - it is probably time to welcome new leadership to your group! (just saying....)

DID YOU KNOW?

10 Simple Things ...you can do to help your library

1. Take a friend or relative — or even a class of youngsters — to the library. Show them what you most enjoy and offer to help them sign up for a library card of their own.
2. Consider a tax-deductible gift to your library. Libraries and library systems often have memorial programs and endowments that provide opportunities to support and improve library services.
3. Remember the library in your estate planning.
4. Sponsor a magazine subscription for the library or donate books — either to the library or to your local Friends organization to raise money for the library.
5. Volunteer your time. Opportunities could include delivering reading materials to shut-ins, helping children or teens with homework or being a reader to preschool children. Ask your library director or branch manager how you can best help.
6. Nominate your library as your community's, your company's or your school's project of the year.
7. Send a letter to the editor of your local newspaper expressing how important the library is to you — and to your community.
8. Speak up for libraries at community groups that you belong to, such as the PTA, Chamber of Commerce, Kiwanis, Rotary, Optimist, Garden Club and others — even your book club! Invite your library director or branch manager to attend a meeting and talk about your library's services and its needs.
9. Attend a regular meeting of the city or county commission or other local funding agency and take the opportunity to thank its members publicly for supporting the library. Or send a short note to a council member to let them know how much you use and appreciate the library.
10. Develop a short "elevator speech" (just a sentence or two) that will help you quickly explain to others why libraries are more important than ever — and use it when you have an opportunity to encourage others to get involved.

LIBRARY LOAN PROGRAM: If you have a library card from a Georgia public library, you can check out a ParkPass and Historic Site Pass, just like you would check out a book. You'll enjoy free parking at Georgia's State Parks and free admission to State Historic Sites.

The pass may be checked out once per year, per card, per household, and is valid for two adults and up to two children. The pass is not valid for fee-based events or programs and may not be combined with other discounts or promotions. Standard general admission will apply to families with additional children; children must be accompanied by an adult.

enjoyed a spectacular evening of live music and dance performances by the University of West Georgia's Jazz Ensemble, conducted by Dr. Dan Bakos, and the UWG Dance Team "WOLFPRIENTS" directed by Dr. Karen Clevenger, UWG alum and current Instructor in the Department of Leadership and Instruction. Dr. Fred Richards was the emcee for the event. Period dress was welcome. Admission was free. "Swing Time" recalls an era when the world was at war and big band music was played everywhere and broadcast to millions

overseas and on the home front via radio. Swing and jazz was the soundtrack for the war. Expressing a defiant hope for liberation and freedom, big band music had a unifying, patriotic effect, raising the morale of soldiers and inspiring Americans at home to fully support the war effort.

Her library director received a free gift of 100 bricks from a fellow Rotary member in the construction business. The library director, Linda Golian-Lui, wanted to use the bricks at the library renovation groundbreaking. It would be a good "hook" at the groundbreaking. Bricks may be the foundation of the building but books are the foundation of the library.

Rita and the library staff cleaned the bricks and painted the bricks various colors with leftover house paints. The students used magic markers to decorate the bricks with their favorite book titles. There were

individual student winners and a student group winner. The bricks are now used to decorate shelves or as centerpieces at library functions.

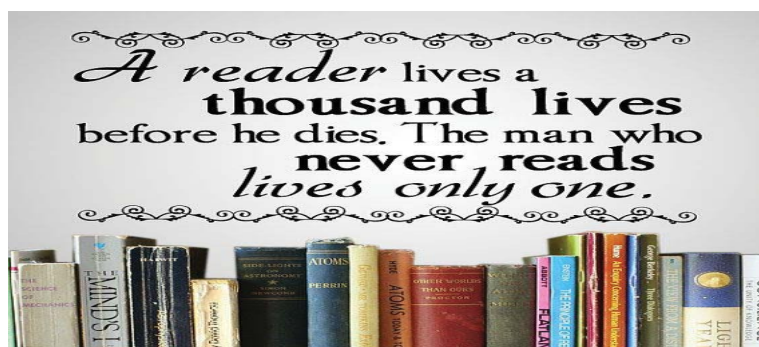
So many students wanted to keep their brick that next spring, Rita plans to have "Paint a Brick" for \$3 or two for \$5 for bookends at the next used book sale.
